The goal for this kitchen renovation was to create a charming and efficient workspace that was appropriate for the 1908 Dutch Colonial-style home. The main challenge for homeowner and interior designer Lane Oliver and her husband Brian was that they, and their nine-month-old twins, were moving into the home within one month of the renovation. The timeframe required as little construction as possible.

5 THINGS TO LOVE

- 1 Oliver gave new life to the cabinets in this once-drab space with paint and added sparkle with green glass knobs. Glass knobs: Grandpa Snazzy's Hardware, (303) 778-6508.
- 2 Removing the heavy soffits and adding bead board and shelving gave height to the room while providing an out-of-reach area to display colorful and fragile accessories.
- 3 The worn and cracked maple floor could not be stained to match the surrounding oak floors, so Oliver opted to paint it a crisp green. This powerful punch transformed the whole space.
- 4 A narrow cabinet was built to add storage and work as a pantry. Chicken wire and fabric add delightful texture to the cabinet and warmth to the room.
